Remembering BRIAN MORGAN



Brian Wilson Morgan who had been the BRAMM Chairman for the last 6 years until recently, sadly passed peacefully away on 24th July 2020 aged 83 years. Born in Roath, Cardiff on 2nd July 1937, he came to the Memorial Masonry industry after a varied career in finance and the early days of computer science.

He joined his family's business of MOSSFORDS, Wales' longest established Memorial Masons, in 1972 when his father, Wilson became ill. Wilson was one of the founder members of NAMM and followed his own father, Brian's grandfather, Barrett Wilson Morgan into the trade following the traditional apprenticeship route and was a renowned master craftsman.

Followed into the business by his sons Simon, David and Michael and five years ago by his grandson (Simon's son) Oliver marking the 5th generation of the family and 3 generations working together, the business has continued to expand over the years, incorporating other memorial businesses and diversifying into national award winning commercial stone masonry and various signage divisions with a main holding company (MS-Group Ltd) with over 100 employees.

Whilst less involved in the day-to-day running of the business for several years Brian continued as Chairman of the company and was active and involved in this family business right up to the start of the Covid Lock-down earlier in the year when his health began to fail more and more.

Brian has been highly regarded within the memorial masonry trade having served as National President of NAMM (The National Association of Memorial Masons) in their centenary year of 2007, after serving as the Honorary National Treasurer for 16 years. Brian was also an enthusiastic Rotarian having been the President of his local Club, a former President of the local 41 Club, raising lots of funds and providing support for many local charities. Brian became an active member of "The Convoy of Hope" helping organise collections and helped in the actual convoys of charitable donations to the poor and needy of Belarus & Croatia at the fall of Communism and following the Croatian War.

Brian was also a devoted follower of his beloved Penarth Rugby Club where he once played as the team hooker and later became the club Chairman for a number of years in the early 1990s and of course was never happier than watching Wales and the British & Irish Lions rugby test matches.

He will be sadly missed by his six children, thirteen grandchildren, his wife Barbara, first wife Rae and all his family and his many friends from BRAMM.

TECHNICAL QUESTIONS.

Abbrieviated summary of questions - June to August 2020

An enquiry was received from a Borough Council who were concerned about moving headstones over 1.2m high in a churchyard. Due to the condition of these memorials, BRAMM recommended using the Councils own structural engineer to advise on moving the memorials for the development of a carpark.

A member of the public asked about the correct depth for a plinth as the base appeared to be the same depth, in fact overhanging as the foundation had a 1" chamfer. The memorial appeared to comply with BS 8415 but just looked wrong, hence the disappointment from the customer.

A member of the public was concerned that no guarantee was given after a memorial had been erected, and when asked the mason did not give a reply.

The Parish Council maintains a closed Churchyard where a damaged memorial is located, pictures were forwarded asking for advice on how this should be rectified.

An enquiry from a mason - I have just removed a headstone for a funeral. It measures headstone 54" high x30" wide x3" thick sitting on a base 34" x12" x3", i.e. overall 57" high x36" wide x12" deep. On reading dowel sizes in the BRAMM Blue Book it mentions minimum thickness of inscription plate as being 3" if between 36 and 48" and 4" if over. So to me this stone does not have the correction thickness for its height. The stone appears to date back to 1982/1983.

BRAMM replied - The granite memorial in question falls outside the scope of BS8415:2018 so we have to use a combination of BS8415 and experience based on common sense. As the material is only 3" thick, great care must be taken when coring the dowel holes for secondary dowelling. I would suggest using 30mmØ holes in the plate and 35mmØ holes in the base. In this case, the secondary dowels should engage to a minimum of 125mm (5") into the plate due to its height of 51" and, if possible, go straight through the 3" base and 2" into the foundation for extra strength and stability. This would mean using two 25mmØ x 10" A2 of A4 grade stainless steel grade dowels. Please allow me to repeat the need for great care and accuracy to be taken when wet coring the 30mmØ dowel holes into the 75mm (3") thick plate as you will only have 22.5mm of 'wall' either side of the plate's dowel holes. It will also be necessary to ensure the ground anchor system you use when re-fixing the memorial is accredited to the size of memorial in question ~ your anchor manufacturer will be able to advise you accordingly.

A member of the public asks – "Is it acceptable for a newly erected headstone to be leaning to one side? If the stone mason won't correct the tilt what can a complaint to yourselves do to remedy the situation if the stonemason is a member of BRAMM?"

BRAMM replied - The BRAMM Blue Book says that when a memorial is erected it should be in-line, level and plumb so in order to comment properly we would need further details such as underpinning substantive photographic evidence, the location and grave number of the memorial, etc. together with any other relevant factors which may assist us. When we are in possession of all the facts we will be in a better position to move the matter forward.

A Parish Council owns and manages its own burial ground enquires about the free BRAMM registration scheme if it can offer advice on health and safety matters.

BRAMM was asked if Level 2 NVQ Diploma Certificate in 'Stonemasonry (Construction) - Stone Fixing (QCF)' is acceptable for the BRAMM register.

BRAMM replied- The qualification is not specifically in Memorial Masonry therefore I'm afraid BRAMM can't accept it as evidence to automatically award a BRAMM Fixer Licence which is the minimum requirement for a BRAMM Registered Fixer.

RESOLVED COMPLAINTS SUMMARY.

Complaint from a Burial Authority over the fact that they tested and broke some memorials and the company who had originally fixed them hadn't been back to fix them. Company concerned said they had used the correct equipment and method but the BA had used too much force. Company subsequently fixed the ones they had originally done out of goodwill.

Complaint from a grave owner that a memorial had been leaning for some time. Due to lockdown, mason concerned said he wasn't working at time so could not go back and rectify the issue. Once he went back to work part time he still hadn't fixed the issue so BRAMM offered to send an assessor to fix the memorial and charge it to the mason - at which point the mason rectified the memorial.

Complaint from another grave owner that a memorial had been leaning for some time.

We notified the mason concerned and they rectified the issue.

SUPPORT VISITS.

The BRAMM Board have agreed to roll out Support Visits to all registered companies. These will be compulsory to maintain a company on the register. An assessor will contact each company a day or two before they are due to arrive. Each visit will only last between 30 – 60 minutes. The pilot scheme has been successful, and has highlighted that some companies are not using materials compliant to BS 8415:2018. The assessor may ask for proof of Compliance such as the dowels, ground anchors or the correct manufactured foundations must contain reinforcing bars.

All companies will be encouraged to comply to the British Standard and would have a follow up visit if deemed necessary. However if on a second visit non-compliance of materials was found then the company would have to put all its BRAMM registered fixers through further training and another BFL assessment, at their expense and within 6 months. Failure to comply for a third time would result in the company losing its registration with BRAMM.

BRAMM simply want to Improve Standards by ensuring memorials are erected safely. Companies will be asked if they are having any issues with Burial authorities and whether BRAMM can help.


